We are exactly one year away from the world premiere of *Kaddish**, on **May 3**, **2008**, at Keene State College in Keene, NH. The buzz is growing, and many, many individuals and organizations have become involved with The Kaddish Project. We continue to develop our partnership with world-renowned Choral Director, Philip Brunelle and VocalEssence in Minneapolis, MN, as we plan the United States tour of Larry Siegel's musical reflection on the Holocaust. Recently, the Apple Hill Chamber Players graciously performed "Piano Quartet on Themes of Kaddish" for a large audience at the NH Jewish Federation and to residents of the Monadnock region. At each event, the response has been overwhelmingly positive.

Our list of advisors** is growing; we have just received the endorsement of Bishop Gene Robinson, the Episcopal Bishop of New Hampshire. The interfaith community has embraced the Project, and we feel sure we will achieve our mission of speaking to people of all faiths and nationalities.

The Kaddish Project

*Kaddish: a prayer recited by mourners after the death of a close relative, as part of Jewish liturgical practice.

The Kaddish Project was commissioned by the Cohen Center for Holocaust Studies at Keene State College to commemorate the Center's 25th anniversary in 2008 and, to quote Elie Wiesel, "further the cause of remembrance." At the project's heart is an original musical work, *Kaddish*, by composer Dr. Lawrence Siegel.

The Kaddish Project will take audiences on a musical journey through the words and memories of survivors, bystanders and perpetrators of the Holocaust. The text of the work will be adapted from testimonies and stories collected in interviews conducted in the United States and abroad. The musical score, written for soloists, chorus, and a large chamber ensemble, will culminate in a message of hope and peace that extends beyond the lines of religion, race, and ethnic background.

By reflecting on the destruction of the vibrant lives and culture of European Jews, the Kaddish Project aims to raise awareness and inspire action to prevent injustice and genocide in the world today. The Project will offer an education component in the form of a study guide, providing age-appropriate learning opportunities for children and adults that can be used by schools, community groups and faith-based organizations.

Kaddish will premiere on May 3, 2008, in Keene, New Hampshire, home of the nationally recognized Cohen Center for Holocaust Studies and Keene State College. Performances in a variety of domestic and international cultural and civic centers will follow. Proceeds from the Kaddish Project will further this mission of the Cohen Center for Holocaust Studies.

The American Composers Forum has awarded a Continental Harmony grant to help underwrite the making of the Kaddish Project.
